Stop TB Partnership

1. *Technical Assistance* (<http://www.stoptb.org/global/fund/taagreement.asp>)

One key area of the work of the Stop TB Partnership, is to provide technical support to the process of developing stronger concept notes and country dialogues to increase the chances of getting funded. Types of activities funded under the Stop TB Partnership's agreement with the Global Fund include:

- Addressing gender, community, human rights and other key affected population matters in TB programme reviews and national strategic plans
- Integrating community systems strengthening activities and services in concept notes
- Engaging TB communities in the funding model process: 1) Country support focal points, 2) Regional trainings and workshops, and 3) Country consultations and missions.
- Promoting the role of TB communities in National TB Programmes, Country Coordinating Mechanisms and other platforms.

NGOs and TB communities and CSOs can apply for this technical support. There is further guidance on their website listed here and you can work through TBEC if anything is unclear.

2. *Challenge Facility* (<http://www.stoptb.org/global/awards/cfcs/>)

The Challenge Facility for Civil Society (CFCS) is an instrument to promote the role of communities in National TB Programmes, and on other high-level platforms, especially in countries supported by the Global Fund.

In the last seven years, the Challenge Facility has given voice to community-based organizations and provided support to those engaged in advocacy and social mobilization activities. The goal has been to empower communities to be a part of all the steps in the fight against TB. The focus of the current call for proposals is to engage communities and people affected by TB.

3. *TB REACH* (<http://www.stoptb.org/global/awards/tbreach/>)

TB REACH was launched in January 2010 with multi-year grant support from the Canadian International Development Agency. TB REACH provides short-term and fast-track grants to projects that aim to achieve early and increased TB case detection using innovative approaches in populations that are poor and vulnerable and have limited access to care.

In 2014, for the wave 4, the Stop TB Partnership's Coordinating Board approved US \$13.9 million in new funding for 33 partners implementing the fourth wave of TB REACH projects. These projects include 11 organizations, which applied through the "small track" with budgets of 200,000 USD or less in response to an expressed need among the TB community to support local organizations who are working on or wish to improve TB case detection.

The Kochon Prize (<http://www.stoptb.org/global/awards/kochon/howtoapply.asp>)

This is awarded annually by Stop TB Partnership to individuals and/or organizations that have made a significant contribution to combating TB. The Kochon Prize, which is endowed by the Kochon Foundation, a non-profit foundation registered in the Republic of Korea, consists of a USD \$65,000 award. The Kochon Prize was established in 2006 in honour of the late Chairman Chong-Kun Lee (left), founder of the Chong Kun Dang Pharmaceutical Corporation and Kochon Foundation in Korea.

Stop TB Partners, Former recipients of the Kochon Prize and National health administration (government body) of a WHO Member State can nominate. Nominations are open to individuals and/or organizations that work in an innovative manner to engage in meaningful way communities in the fight against TB and especially in detecting the missing cases. There is no restriction on the age, sex or nationality of potential nominees. More details:

NGOs, CSOs and community based organisations are eligible for a vast part of EU funding, as they are involved in many areas covered by EU policies on a non-profit basis, a precondition for receiving funding from EU coffers. This includes issues around health. Funding is available both under direct access programmes run by the Commission as under programmes financed through structural funds, and available at the regional authorities. There will be an EU delegation in your country and so I'd recommend getting in touch with them

GIZ – German BACKUP Initiative

The government and civil society partners are enabled to successfully apply for and utilise Global Fund grants in order to implement measures for controlling HIV, tuberculosis and malaria more effectively and sustainably. Therefore, since 2002, the global health programme German BACKUP Initiative has

The initiative was commissioned by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and has been co-funded by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) since 2013.

The German BACKUP Initiative's services include:

- Assignment of experts to provide process and technical consultancy to organisations and networks
- Capacity development for government and civil society actors
- Financing agreements with governmental and non-governmental organisations for implementing project work.

The Robert Carr civil society Networks Fund (RCNF) (<http://www.robertcarrfund.org/about/mission-objectives/>)

RCNF launched in Washington DC in July 2012, aims to support civil society networks in addressing critical factors for scaling up access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support and to protect the rights of inadequately served populations (ISP) across the world. Networks influence governments and donors for sustainable provision of reliable, financial allocation for HIV response programs. Networks absorb and effectively allocate an appropriate part of HIV related funding among relevant community service organizations

KMF are an NGO committed to promoting cooperation with Central- and Eastern European partners in the medical realm (KMF) together with the Association of Research-based Pharmaceutical Companies.

Objectives and Aims of KMF:

- Harmonization of German and Russian healthcare
- Bringing together German and Russian expertise within the health sector while acknowledging that Russian Society is a relationship oriented society
- Strengthening ideas in civil society by cooperating within the health sector

One of the section KMF works is the tuberculosis, which connects fundamental research in immunology and microbiology to an improvement in diagnosing tuberculosis in Russia as well as implementing WHO quality standards. Furthermore, joint epidemiological projects should contribute to further understanding of the spread of tuberculosis pathogens and multi-resistant pathogens.
